Message from Miss Amis

Our Christmas celebrations have been well under way this week. We hope our EYFS and KS1 families enjoyed their child's nativity performance. All the children worked so hard and sang their little hearts out and we as staff were so proud of them. We want to thank the village hall committee for letting us use the hall and thank our families for supporting us with this change too.

Our KS2 children shined in their carol concert in the Church this week. They sang so fabulously and read their lines so clearly, making us super proud!

On Monday we look forward to our Christingle celebrations in the Church and hope you can join us too. We will begin at 2pm.

On Wednesday we invite children to come dressed in a Christmas jumper and non-school uniform trousers/leggings.

All that leaves me to say is we wish all of our families a very happy Christmas!

This Month's Curriculum Focus: Music

Our Music curriculum is personally crafted by our Music Subject Leader, following the National Curriculum and is supported by the Charanga music scheme. This blend of planning is personalised towards the excellent musical resources we have in our Federation, the interests of the children, and provides them with a wide scope of exposure to international, generational and historical music genres.

Over the course of their journey at Swallowtail, the children will explore learning to play and compose their own music on a variety of tuned and untuned instruments, as well as dipping into digital composition in Key Stage 2. Untuned instruments include: percussion and djembes. Tuned instruments include: glockenspiels, Garage Band for digital music and the ukulele. Music theory and music history is woven into each unit, but is also taught explicitly as a unit in each year at school. The children are encouraged, but never pressured to perform what they have learned or composed in class. Their musical experiences outside of school are also celebrated, should they wish to share this with us!

Music work is recorded in samples by the teacher and kept in a digital file by the Music Subject Leader. Once a year, when the children study Music History and Theory, their recorded work is kept in a treasury tagged folder that will be passed up through their years at school.

This Autumn, Year 1 and 2 have listened to an array of rap music and have been using the djembes to create rhythms as well as to lead and participate in community drum circles. Year 3 and 4 have listened to various spiritually influenced music from a range of genres and used percussion instruments to convey emotion and supplement story lines. Year 5 and 6 have listened to rock music from various decades and have been using the glockenspiels for the 3rd time in the Primary musical experience, which has progressed to include reading music on a staff to play familiar and unfamiliar pieces. The second half of the Autumn term is always reserved for singing practise, in preparation for their Nativity performance in Key Stage 1 and Carol Concert in Key Stage 2.

In the Spring, Year 1 and 2 will use percussion, Year 3 and 4 the djembes and Year 5 and 6 will delve into the Romantic period in music history (1820-1900), in particular, looking at the work of Chopin and Tchaikovsky.
